Cemetery News

Briscoe Cemetery Report by Bob Painter of Pilot Grove

The cold weather has limited the amount of work that I can perform there. I recently brought two stones to my shop that were badly broken, and now have them restored. As soon as the weather breaks, I will cast new bases out of concrete, and reinstall the stones in the cemetery.



These are the markers for Annie Hughes, who died in 1862 at a little over a year in age, and eighteen-year-old Cynthia Taylor, who died in 1853. I am repairing William Palmer's broken marker on the grounds, and it is almost finished. I have been keeping a good photographic record of each stone and the stages of repair they require.

In December, while probing the ground for a missing base, I discovered a small limestone marker for little Margaret Leonard. She died in 1841 at nine months of age. She was buried next to her brother George, who died in

1843, also nine months old. They are thought to be the only members of the "Ravenswood" Leonard's to be buried in Briscoe Cemetery. After finding Margaret's stone, I was able to identify George's stone due to its shape and location next to hers. His stone is nearly illegible."

Interesting History

Madora Josephine Eller Mangold (1854-1945)

Daughter of James McCarty Eller & Eleanor "Nellie" Cole; Granddaughter to William Temple Cole and Hannah Allison Cole



Madora Josephine Eller Mangold was born in 1854 in Missouri, the eldest of 5 children but with 5 stepsiblings. She married her schoolteacher [John Adam Mangold] at the age of 15. He was an older, established, educated man, [and] I am sure [he is] just what her parents would have dreamed of for her. In 1883, after [having] a family of six children, John Adam Mangold was persuaded by a colony leader to go with him across the Rio Grande River near Eagle Pass, Texas [and] into Old Mexico and teach in his new colony and help set up the colony. Madora and John loaded up their family in three wagons, took livestock, and headed for Mexico in the spring of 1884. When they arrived at the river, a terrible electrical storm began, and all the livestock scattered and were lost as a result of the storm. John

Adam Mangold was already sick physically and was mentally worried about his move to Mexico. After crossing the Rio Grande at Eagle Pass and making camp, John Adam became very sick and died a victim of Bright's disease at the age of 51. Madora loaded her belongings and children and came back to the U. S. side of Eagle Pass. She buried her husband in a cemetery in Eagle Pass and headed home to her family near Kerrville, Texas. Upon arrival she found her livestock that had scattered at the Rio Grande in the electrical storm were all back on the farm. Madora camped on Turkey Creek where her father and mother live. In July she delivered her seventh child, six months after the death of her husband and set about trying to make a living, alone for her family. In 1891 two of Madora's brothers rode into Oklahoma territory to what became Eller Flat, northwest of Durham, Oklahoma. They dug a dugout house just over the line from Texas and wrote their sister "Come to the land of milk and honey. You will see the time that the land will be worth \$1.00 per acre. On April 1, 1892, Madora began a 5-month trek to homesteaded land with all seven of her children as well as two granddaughters. Madora arrived in Oklahoma on October 1, 1892, and set about establishing a home for her family. Madora never remarried but busied herself helping other mothers have their children. She was a mid-wife for over 100 children born near Canadian, Texas and Antelope Hills, Oklahoma. Madora died at the age of 92 in 1945 after living 61 years as a widow and breadwinner for her family. Cole Family Recipe

Memory and recipe provided by Nancy Aldrich of Pilot Grove, MO. "This recipe is my grandmother's, Cordie Solomon-Painter. She would bake it every year at Christmas. The fudge and black walnut frosting was like having a piece of fudge between each layer of cake. I use buttermilk frosting which is easier and not so rich." Nancy brings it every year to the reunion.

Mashed Potato Cake

Made with love from the kitchen of Cordie Solomon-Painter of Pilot Grove, MO

INGREDIENTS

| 2/3 cup butter | 2 teaspoons baking powder |
|---------------------|--|
| 2 cup white sugar | 1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon |
| 4 eggs, separated. | 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg |
| 1/2 cup sweet milk | 1/2 teaspoon cloves |
| 1 cup mashed potato | 1 square unsweetened chocolate, melted. |
| 2 cup flour | 1 cup chopped nuts (I use black walnuts) |

DIRECTIONS

Cream butter and sugar. Add egg yolks, milk and potatoes and mix well. Stir in flour, baking powder and spices till well blended. Add melted chocolate. Beat egg whites till stiff peaks and fold into cake batter. Stir in nuts. Place in 3 round cake pans. Bake 350 degree for 45 to 50 minutes until done.

FROSTING

1/2 cup margarine4 tablespoon coco powder1/4 cup water4 1/2 cup powdered sugar

2 tablespoon powdered buttermilk 1/4 teaspoon Chopped nuts.
